The Humble Prayer

"...Christ spoke the parable of the Pharisee and the publican. The Pharisee goes up to the temple to worship, not because he feels that he is a sinner in need of pardon, but because he thinks himself righteous and hopes to win commendation. His worship he regards as an act of merit that will recommend him to God. At the same time it will give the people a high opinion of his piety. he hopes to secure favor with both God and man. His worship is prompted by self-interest.

"And he is full of self-praise. He looks it, he walks it, he prays it. Drawing apart from others as if to say, 'Come not near to me; for I am holier than thou' (Isaiah 65:5), he stands and prays 'with himself.' Wholly self-satisfied, he thinks that God and men regard him with the same complacency...." (Christ's Object Lesson 150)



Kneeling helps us to become humble and submit our wills to the Lord. It is important to follow the examples of Christ and the good men in the Bible as to our position in prayer.




Prayer is a protection against sin. Reverence God daily by praying often.

The Cow's Circulatory in comparison to The Human Circulatory System






Nature What Is a Flower?

What is a flower? The word flower means, "the best of everything." That is just what God was giving the children of Israel, "the best of everything." They needed to learn to **trust** in Him, that He was providing them the best food, water, and protection.

The flower is the reproductive part of any seed-bearing plant. Weeds, trees, shrubs, vines, vegetables and grasses all have flowers. There are about 250,000 varieties of flowering plants. There were over a million Israelites who came out of Egypt. Some were like weeds, some like trees, some like vines, but all needed to learn to trust their lives to God so they could bloom and fulfill the purpose God intended for them.

Flowers grow almost everywhere form snow-covered mountains to hot, dry deserts. Wherever they grow that place is more beautiful. The children of Israel were like flowers trying to grow on the desert. However, they needed to learn to trust in God that they might make the desert a beautiful, blooming flower garden.

"The wilderness and the solitary place shall be glad for them; and the desert shall rejoice, and blossom as the rose. It shall blossom abundantly, and rejoice even with joy and singing: the glory of Lebanon shall be given unto it, the excellency of Carmel and Sharon, they shall see the glory of the Lord, and the excellency of our God" (Isaiah 35:1-2). God may allow the little landscape of our lives to become barren like a desert so that others may see, by way of contrast, "the excellency of our God" in causing us to bloom in such unfavorable circumstances.



Oriental Lilies bloom from mid to late summer. They have large, outward-facing flowers that open wide and are more flat than trumpet-like. The pink and white lily known as 'Stargazer' is a type of Oriental lily. Flower colors for Oriental lilies range from yellow and white through pink and burgundy, with many displaying contrasting freckles or stripes on their petals. Double varieties are also available. Oriental lilies are ideal for perennial gardens and they also grow well in containers

Stargazer plant flowers

Stargazer lily flowers are generally dark pink or crimson in the middle which gradually fades to the edge of the petals. The petal edges and tips are often shades of white to very light pink.

Star lily flowers have large petals that bloom wide open, and some types of Stargazers have petals that curve back on themselves.

In the center of the flower are long striking stamens covered in dark yellow pollen.

Some say that double bloom stargazer lily flowers are even more stunning with their multiple rows of bright pink petals.

Although their flowers look like stars,



Stargazer lilies get their name from the fact that the stems grow tall and the flowers look to the heavens. Stargazer lilies thrive well even in poor soil and can grow to a height of 3 ft. (0.9 m). Each stem can grow between 2 and 8 colorful flowers measuring around 6" (15 cm) in diameter.

- 1. Scientists divide the over 3,000 cicada species into two groups: annual and periodical. Annual cicadas emerge from the ground at different times each summer.
- 2. They're usually dark with greenish markings. These insects avoid predators by camouflaging themselves in the trees and flying from hungry birds and moles.
- 3. Only seven species of cicadas are in the other group, called periodical cicadas. These bugs all emerge from the ground at the same time.
- 4. Called broods, these groups appear after a dormant period of either 13 or 17 years. That's a long nap!
- 5. Periodical cicadas live only in the central and eastern part of the United States.

A Bug's Life

Cicadas start their lives as eggs. Females lay 200 to 400 eggs in tiny holes that they make in the branches of trees and shrubs. After six to 10 weeks, cicada young called nymphs hatch from the eggs and immediately fall to the ground. They burrow underground and attach to tree roots. The nymphs stay buried to suck tree sap from two to 17 years, depending on the species. When this underground life—called the dormant period—ends, the cicadas emerge aboveground at sunset, climb the trunk of a nearby tree, and shed their skin. Now they're adult cicadas.

Next, male cicadas fill the air with shrill buzzing sounds created by rapidly vibrating drum-like plates on their abdomens. The females make clicking sounds with their wings if they like the song. They mate, lay their eggs, and then both male and female cicadas die after just about five weeks aboveground.





Energizing the Created World

"In the beginning God created the heaven and the earth." This tells us that God has always been, but man had a beginning. "Before the mountains were brought forth, or ever thou hadst formed the earth and the world, even from everlasting to everlasting, thou art God" (Psalm 90:2). The word "God" (Elohim) is plural, meaning that God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit worked together in the creation of this earth.

There is an example of how "by the word of the Lord were the heavens made; and all the host of them by the <u>breath</u> of <u>his mouth</u>" (Psalm 33:6). In the late 1800's tests were done to show visible sound. The effects of the sound of a person's voice were tested.

God created each thing in an organized **order**. On the first day came the light (energy), then air, plants, animals to eat the plants, until man the crowning act of creation. Remember, light is a visible form of energy, which, by its action on plants, transforms inorganic elements and compounds into food.

As God looked at each single act of creation He said, "it was good." He divided the light from the darkness. God set up the day and night cycle on the first day of Creation.



"And God made two great lights; the greater light to rule the day, and the lesser light to rule the night: he made the stars also.

"And the evening and the morning were the fourth day" (Genesis 1:14-19).

On the fourth day God set the heavenly bodies in the heavens as **or-derly** time markers. The moon and the stars were to rule the night while the sun was to rule the day. They were to divide the day from the night, to regulate, and to continue from that time forward showing the difference between light and darkness, which has existed from the first **orderly** day of creation.

The days, months, and years are fixed by the movement of the sun and the moon. These heavenly lights would become a permanent arrangement of the distribution of light for this world.

Let us think for a moment about how the earth looked at sunset on the fourth day. It was no longer without form, nor covered with darkness. The waters had been gathered together. Trees, flowers, and grass covered the earth. As the sun sank out of sight, the stars sparkled brightly in the clear sky, and the light from the moon made the night almost as beautiful as the day. But the work of creation was not yet finished. God had more plans for the earth. So it is with our lives. At each stage of development we can please God and yet He has more in store for us. Even though He saw that each step of creation was "very good" that was no reason to stop. "Being confident of this very thing, that he which hath begun a good work in you will perform it until the day of Jesus Christ" (Philippians 1:6).

Sun

The Sun is in the center of our Solar System.

as He was in Paul's life.


The night bathed in the beauty of moonlight is also an object lesson of how God wants to use His people to reflect silvery beams from Heaven into the great void of spiritual darkness. "But we all, with open face beholding [reflecting] as in a glass [mirror] the glory of the Lord, are changed into the same image from glory to glory, even as by the Spirit of the Lord" (II Corinthians 3:18). The great purpose of life is to develop a people that will pass the judgment because they have been changed into the image of the Lord.

We, too, may reflect God's light if we place ourselves in right relation to Him. Even if our lives have been marred, like the scarred and pitted surface of the moon, we can still shine with "the beauty of the Lord God" upon us. The moon even suggests what kind of beauty we may shine with. The moon's soft, pale light, so different from that of the "Greater Light," rules the night in gentleness. Its mild rays bless us with one of the most restful and lovely sights on Earth. It is an emblem of the meek and lowly One, who veiled His glory and came to shine in Earth's dark night of sin. He came to give us a practical example of how to reflect the glory of the Father.

The difference between the light of the moon and the light of the Sun is like the difference between man's speaking the truth and God's Word. In the judgment our words will be compared to the standard of the Word to see if they reflect it.

The moon has light and beauty because of its position in the heavens.

The Earth and Its Moon



Genesis 1:16, 18 (KJV)

He judges his character, not by the holy character of God,

This is the secret of his self-satisfaction. {COL 150.3}

Continuing: He proceeds to recount his good deeds: "I fast twice in the week, I give tithes of all that I possess." The religion of the Pharisee does not touch the soul. He is not seeking Godlikeness of character, a heart filled with love and mercy. He is satisfied with a religion that has to do only with outward life. His righteousness is his own--the fruit of his own works and judged by a human standard. {COL 151.1} Whoever trusts in himself that he is righteous, will despise others. As the Pharisee judges himself by other men, so he judges other men by himself. His righteousness is estimated by theirs, and the worse they are the more righteous by contrast he appears. His self-righteousness leads to accusing. "Other men" he condemns as transgressors of God's law. Thus he is making manifest the very spirit of Satan, the accuser of the brethren. With this spirit it is impossible for him to enter into communion with God. He goes down to his house destitute of the divine blessing. {COL 151.2} The publican had gone to the temple with other worshipers, but he soon drew apart from them as unworthy to unite in their devotions. Standing afar off, he "would not lift up so much as his eyes unto heaven, but smote upon his breast," in bitter anguish and self-abhorrence. He felt that he had transgressed against God, that he was sinful and polluted. He could not expect even pity from those around him, for they looked upon him with contempt. He knew that he had no merit to commend him to God, and in utter self-despair he cried, "God be merciful to me, a sinner." He did not compare himself with others. Overwhelmed with a sense of guilt, he stood as if alone in God's presence. His only desire was for pardon and peace, his only plea was the mercy of God.


After the resurrection the priests and rulers circulated the report that Christ did not die upon the cross, that He merely fainted, and was afterward revived. Another report affirmed that it was not a real body of flesh and bone, but the likeness of a body, that was laid in the tomb. The action of the Roman soldiers disproves these falsehoods. They broke not His legs, because He was already dead. To satisfy the priests, they pierced His side. Had not life been already extinct, this wound would have caused instant death. {DA 772.1}



But it was not the spear thrust, it was not the pain of the cross, that caused the death of Jesus. That cry, uttered "with a loud voice" (Matthew 27:50; Luke 23:46), at the moment of death, the stream of blood and water that flowed from His side, declared that He died of a broken heart. His heart was broken by mental anguish. He was slain by the sin of the world. **{DA 772.2}**



With the death of Christ the hopes of His disciples perished. They looked upon His closed eyelids and drooping head, His hair matted with blood, His pierced hands and feet, and their anguish was indescribable. Until the last they had not believed that He would die; they could hardly believe that He was really dead. {Next Slide Please}




Overwhelmed with sorrow, they did not recall His words foretelling this very scene. Nothing that He had said

now gave them comfort. They saw only the cross and its bleeding Victim.


The future seemed dark with despair.
Their faith in Jesus had perished; but never had they loved their Lord as now.
Never before had they so felt His worth, and their need of His presence. {DA 772.3}




Even in death, Christ's body was very precious to His disciples. They longed to give Him an honored burial, but knew not how to accomplish this. **Treason against the Roman** government was the crime for which Jesus was condemned, and persons put to death for this offense were consigned to a burial ground especially provided for such criminals. {Next Slide Please}



Continuing: The disciple John with the women from Galilee had remained at the cross. They could not leave the body of their Lord to be handled by the unfeeling soldiers, and buried in a dishonored grave. Yet they could not prevent it. They could obtain no favors from the Jewish authorities, and they had no influence with Pilate. **{DA 772.4}**




In this emergency, Joseph of Arimathaea and Nicodemus came to the help of the disciples. Both these men were members of the Sanhedrin, and were acquainted with Pilate. Both were men of wealth and influence. They were determined that the body of Jesus should have an honorable burial. **{DA 773.1}**



Joseph went boldly to Pilate, and begged from him the body of Jesus. For the first time, Pilate learned that Jesus was really dead. **Conflicting reports** had reached him in regard to the events attending the crucifixion, but the knowledge of Christ's death had been purposely kept from him. {Next Slide Please}



Continuing: Pilate had been warned by the priests and rulers against deception by Christ's disciples in regard to His body. Upon hearing Joseph's request, he therefore sent for the centurion who had charge at the cross, and learned for a certainty of the death of Jesus. He also drew from him an account of the scenes of Calvary, confirming the testimony of Joseph. {DA 773.2}



The request of Joseph was granted. While John was troubled about the burial of his Master, Joseph returned with Pilate's order for the body of Christ; and Nicodemus came bringing a costly mixture of myrrh and aloes, of about a hundred pounds' weight, for His embalming. The most honored in all Jerusalem could not have been shown more respect in death. The disciples were astonished to see these wealthy rulers as much interested as they themselves in the burial of their Lord. {DA 773.3}
