Chapter 22 – "Condemned by Pilate" Part 4

Continuing: As the acts of His torturers degraded them below humanity, into the likeness of Satan, so did the meekness and patience of Jesus exalt Him above <u>humanity</u>, <u>and prove His kinship to God</u>. **{SJ 136.1**}

Pilate was deeply moved by <u>the uncomplaining patience of the Saviour</u>. He sent for Barabbas to be brought into the court; then he presented the two prisoners side by side.
Pointing to the Saviour, he said in a voice of solemn entreaty, "Behold the man." "I bring Him forth to you, that ye may know that I find no fault in Him." John 19:5, 4. {SJ 136.2} There stood the Son of God, wearing the robe of mockery and the crown of thorns. Stripped to the waist, His back showed the long, cruel stripes from which the blood flowed freely. His face was stained with blood, and bore the marks of exhaustion and pain; but never had it appeared more beautiful. Every feature expressed gentleness and resignation, and the tenderest pity for His cruel foes. {SJ 136.3}

Continuing: In striking contrast was the prisoner at His side. Every line of the countenance of Barabbas showed him to be the hardened ruffian that he was. **{SJ 136.4**}

Among the beholders there were some who sympathized with Jesus. Even the priests and rulers were convicted <u>that He was what He claimed to be</u>. But they would not yield. They had moved the mob to a mad fury, and again priests, rulers, and people raised the cry: {**SJ 136.5**} "Crucify Him, crucify Him!" {**SJ 136.6**} At last, losing all patience with their unreasonable, vengeful cruelty,


Pilate said to them:{SJ 136.7}

"Take ye Him, and crucify Him: for I find no fault in Him." John 19:6. {SJ 137.1}

Nature Kinds of Trees

Do you know how many different kinds of trees there are? There are about 20,000 different kinds. There are the mighty forest trees and the fragile ornamental trees. There are even more kinds of people, but each one is unique. The mighty forest trees towering above the others in strength can remind us of Adam, and the fragile ornamental trees make us think of lovely Eve. Together they reflected God's image. "He is strong in power" and "the beauty of the Lord" is majestic beyond our imagination (Isaiah 40:26; Psalm 27:4). In Adam and Eve and in their garden home were represented certain elements of heaven and of God's character—"strength and beauty." "Honor and majesty are before him: strength and beauty are in his sanctuary" (Psalm 96:6).

Sometimes God combines "strength and beauty" together in one object. Sometimes He separates them.

The separation of "strength and beauty" is a little more striking when they are contrasted. Of this contrast we find examples in man and woman (the weaker sex), in the vine and the oak, in the violet sheltered in the cleft of the rock, and in the rainbow overhanging the waterfall.

But these qualities of God, so often separated and contrasted in nature, are also often combined. This is the case in trees. In the oak, "strength" is the first impression. Its sturdy trunk is the emblem of strength; and yet an oak, with its full canopy of glossy leaves, is not without "beauty." On the other hand, in the elm, "beauty" is the outstanding characteristic. With its light form compared with its height, with its symmetrical (evenly balanced) top and hanging branches, it



stands like a veiled bride in her beauty. Even so, there is an underlying impression of *"strength"* combined with the overall sense of the *"beauty"* of the elm.

But it is in human form that these qualities are capable of their highest and most perfect combination. A <u>strong</u> body in which the countenance radiates with *"the beauty of holiness"* is a fit representative of the *"image of God."*

Now He wanted some creatures in His own image to be a part of His family. Trees faintly resemble man's physical being. Man has a trunk and limbs. God designed for man to see the resemblance between himself and the trees and to learn lessons from these kinds of the plant kingdom. Trees can be divided into six main groups according to certain characteristics they have in common. These six groups are:

- (1) broadleaf trees;
- (2) needleleaf trees;
- (3) palm, pandanus, and lily trees;
- (4) cycad trees;
- (5) tree ferns; and
- (6) ginkgo trees.

Broadleaf trees are called hardwoods because many of these trees, like beeches, maples, and oaks, have tough, hardwood. Hardwood trees make the best furniture. There are broadleaf trees, like basswoods and cottonwoods, with soft, lightweight wood. Man was created perfect, like the hardwood, to be tough and strong. "On everything upon the earth, from the loftiest tree of the forest to the lichen that clings to the rock... they may behold the image and superscription* of God." Education 100



As well as gold and silver treasures, European explorers brought back new foods from the Americas. Potatoes, tomatoes, and peppers, plants native to America, were all unknown in Europe before 1500. Potatoes were at first a luxury, served only to rich people at banquets. Chocolate, from the cacao tree, was first brought to Spain from Mexico in 1520. Also from the New World came tobacco (a curse to the old world), turkeys, and corn.

Wild Turkey Facts for Kids

- 1. Scientific Name: The wild turkey's scientific name is Meleagris gallopavo.
- 2. Habitat: Wild turkeys are found in North America, primarily in forests, grasslands, and wetlands.
- 3. Diet: They are omnivores, eating seeds, nuts, fruits, insects, and small animals.
- 4. Physical Features: Wild turkeys can weigh between 5.4 to 24 pounds and have long legs, a fanshaped tail, and a distinctive wattle (the fleshy part hanging from their neck).
- 5. Coloration: Their feathers are usually a mix of brown, black, and iridescent colors, helping them , blend into their surroundings.
- 6. Behavior: Wild turkeys are social birds, often seen in flocks. They can fly short distances at speeds up to 55 miles per hour.
- 7. Communication: They make various sounds, including gobbles, clucks, and purrs, to communicate with each other.
- 8. **Reproduction:** Mating season occurs in spring. Females lay about **10-14 eggs** in a nest on the ground.
- 9. Lifespan: In the wild, wild turkeys can live up to 3-5 years, but some can live longer in protected areas.
- **10.** Fun Fact: Wild turkeys can see in color and have excellent vision, which helps them spot predators.

How Snow Is Formed

"For he saith to the snow, Be thou on the earth...."

Job 37:6





Snow is created when water vapor in the clouds condenses into droplets of water. The droplets grow in size as more water vapor condenses onto them. When they reach a sufficiently cool temperature, they freeze into an ice crystal. When the temperature drops to around 5° F, the crystal begins to grow into a 6-branched snowflake. As more water vapor condenses onto the snowflake, it grows in size and shape. When it becomes heavy enough, it begins to fall as snow.

Most snowflakes are hexagonally-based, that is, in a formation with 6 sides or 6 branches. Snowflake crystals come in an endless variety of shapes and patterns. Children's Bible Activity Book - Lesson 4 - Page 73







Continuing: Beginning at Moses, the very Alpha of Bible history, Christ expounded in all the Scriptures the things concerning Himself. Had He first made Himself known to them, their hearts would have been satisfied. In the fullness of their joy they would have hungered for nothing more. But it was necessary for them to understand the witness borne to Him by the types and prophecies of the Old Testament. **{Next Slide Please}**




Continuing: Upon these their faith must be established. **Christ performed no miracle** to convince them, but it was His first work to explain the Scriptures. They had looked upon His death as the destruction of all their hopes. Now He showed from the prophets that this was the very strongest evidence for their faith. **{DA 796.4}**



In teaching these disciples, Jesus showed the importance of the Old Testament as a witness to His mission. **Many professed Christians** now discard the Old **Testament**, claiming that it is no longer of any use. **But such is not Christ's** teaching. So highly did He value it that at one time He said, "If they hear not Moses and the prophets, neither will they be persuaded, though one rose from the dead." Luke 16:31. {DA 799.1}



It is the voice of Christ that speaks through patriarchs and prophets, from the days of Adam even to the closing scenes of time. The Saviour is revealed in the Old Testament as clearly as in the New. It is the light from the prophetic past that brings out the life of Christ **{Next Slide Please}**




Continuing: and the teachings of the New Testament with clearness and beauty. The miracles of Christ are a proof of His divinity; but a stronger proof that He is the world's **Redeemer** is found in comparing the prophecies of the Old Testament with the history of the New. **{DA 799.2}**



Reasoning from prophecy, Christ gave His disciples a correct idea of what He was to be in humanity. Their expectation of a Messiah who was to take His throne and kingly power in accordance with the desires of men had been misleading. It would interfere with a correct apprehension of His descent from the highest to the lowest position that could be occupied. {Next Slide Please}




Christ desired that the ideas of His disciples might be pure and true in every specification. They must understand as far as possible in regard to the cup of suffering that had been apportioned to Him. He showed them that the awful conflict which they could not yet comprehend was the fulfillment of the covenant made before the foundation of the world was laid. **{Next Slide Please}**



Continuing: Christ must die, as every transgressor of the law must die if he continues in sin. All this was to be, but it was not to end in defeat, but in glorious, eternal victory. Jesus told them that every effort must be made to save the world from sin. His followers must live as He lived, and work as He worked, with intense, persevering effort. **{DA 799.3}**



Thus Christ discoursed to His disciples, opening their minds that they might understand the Scriptures. The disciples were weary, but the conversation did not flag. Words of life and assurance fell from the Saviour's lips. But still their eyes were holden. As He told them of the overthrow of Jerusalem, they looked upon the doomed city with weeping. But little did they yet suspect who their traveling companion was. They did not think that the subject of their conversation was walking by their side; **{Next Slide Please}**



Continuing: for Christ referred to Himself as though He were another person. They thought that He was one of those who had been in attendance at the great feast, and who was now returning to his home. He walked as carefully as they over the rough stones, now and then halting with them for a little rest. Thus they proceeded along the mountainous road, while the One who was soon to take His position at God's right hand, and who could say, "All power is given unto Me in heaven and in earth," walked beside them. Matthew 28:18. {DA 800.1}

"It is our duty to love him as our Redeemer. He commands our love, and as a friend he invites our love. Christ's invitation to us all is a call to a life of peace and rest,--a life of liberty and love, and to a rich inheritance in the future immortal life. Why, then, should we resist his invitation and refuse his love? If we choose to live with Christ through the ceaseless ages of eternity, why not choose him as our best and most honored and loved companion here? Christ calls us to walk with him in this world in the path of humble, trustful obedience, which will secure a pure, holy, happy life.

Which will we choose,--liberty in Christ, or bondage and tyranny in the service of Satan? It is our privilege to have a calm, close, happy walk with Jesus every day we live. **{RH, August 2, 1881 par. 7}**

We need not be alarmed if this path of liberty is laid through conflicts and sufferings. The liberty we shall enjoy will be the more valuable because we made sacrifices to obtain it. The peace which passeth knowledge will cost us battles with the powers of darkness, struggles severe against selfishness and inward sins.

"The victories gained daily through persevering, untiring effort in well-doing, will be precious through Christ who hath loved us, "who gave himself for us that he might redeem us from all iniquity, and purify unto himself a peculiar people zealous of good works." The excellence of Christ we should seek to obtain. In the face of temptation we should school ourselves to firm endurance, which will not provoke one murmuring thought, although we may be weary in toiling, and in fighting the good fight of faith." **{RH, August 2, 1881 par. 8}**

Thank God that some have passed through afflictions with light undimmed. Their hope and faith are strong, because acquired by conflict and nurtured by suffering. If it were not for these heroes of faith, who have learned to endure, and to suffer and be strong, the outlook would be indeed discouraging. How could any of us know how to sympathize with the sorrowing, the burdened, the afflicted. and be to them the help they need, if we had never experienced similar trials ourselves?

We cannot appreciate our Redeemer in the highest sense until we can see him by the eye of faith reaching to the very depths of human wretchedness, taking upon himself the nature of man, the capacity to suffer, and by suffering putting forth his divine power to save and lift sinners up to companionship with himself. Oh, why have we so little sense of sin? Why so little penitence? It is because we do not come nearer the cross of Christ. Conscience becomes hardened through the deceitfulness of sin,

because we remain away from Christ. Consider the Captain of our salvation. He suffered shame for us that we might not suffer everlasting shame and contempt. He suffered on the cross, that mercy might be granted to fallen man. God's justice is preserved, and guilty man is pardoned. Jesus dies that the sinner might live. Shame is borne by the Son of the Highest for the sake of poor sinners, that they might be ransomed and crowned with eternal glory. **{RH, August 2, 1881 par. 9}**

The cross of Calvary appeals in power, affording a reason why we should love Christ now, and why we should consider him first, and best, and last, in everything. We should take our fitting place in humble penitence at the foot of the cross. We may learn the lessons of meekness and lowliness of mind as we go up to Mount Calvary, and, looking upon the cross, see our Saviour in agony, the Son of God dying, the just for the unjust. Behold Him who could summon legions of angels to his assistance with one word, a subject of jest and

merriment, of reviling and hatred. He gives himself a sacrifice for sin. When reviled, he threatened not; when falsely accused, he opened not his mouth. He prays on the cross for his murderers. He is dying for them. He is paying an infinite price for every one of them. He would not lose one whom he has purchased at so great cost. He gives himself to be smitten, and scourged, without a murmur. And this uncomplaining victim is the Son of God. His throne is from everlasting, and his kingdom shall have no end. **{RH, August 2, 1881 par. 10}**

REFLECTION: Psalms 85:10 (KJV) Mercy and truth are met together; righteousness and peace have kissed [each other].

"Mighty truths have been committed to human agencies, truths which, when unfolded, quicken into activity the minds of men and women who are in the darkness of error, and call to them, <u>"Come; for all things are</u> <u>now ready."</u> The knowledge of truth is the great power of God unto salvation to all who believe. The atoning sacrifice, the righteousness of Christ, is to us the vital center of all truth. In the cross of Calvary, mercy and truth are met together, righteousness and peace have kissed each other.
